(1) To convince Jewish readers that Jesus the Nazarene is the Messiah - 'the one who was to come'

(2) To equip Jewish Christians to 'make disciples' of their fellow countrymen and people from 'all nations'

<u>Ch 3-4 – The Introduction</u>

3:1 In those days John the Baptist came, preaching in the Desert of Judea...

3:13 Then Jesus came from Galilee to the Jordan to be baptised by John.

4:1 Then Jesus was led by the Spirit into the desert to be tempted by the devil.

4:12 When Jesus heard that John had been put in prison, he returned to Galilee.

4:18 As Jesus was walking beside the Sea of Galilee, he saw two brothers...

A Introductory parable: the sower (1-9)

Interlude: the purpose of parables (10-17)

explanation of the parable of the sower (18-23)

 - C' Parable of the yeast and the dough (33)
 - Interlude: the purpose of parables (34-35)

explanation of the parable of the weeds (36-43)

- D Parable of the hidden treasure (44)

Interlude: explanation of the parable of the net (49)

A' Concluding parable: the householder (51-53)

E.g. Chapters 19 and 20

- A¹ 19:3-9 Dialogue with Pharisees <u>marriage and divorce</u> 'what God has joined together, let man not separate'
 - **B**¹ 19:10-12 Disciples cynical (worldly) about marriage *'if this is the situation...it is better not to marry'*

Jesus teaches them...(about singleness)

'not everyone can accept this word, but only those to whom it has been given'

C¹ 19:13-15 Children being bought to Jesus Jesus teaches his dsiciples: 'the kingdom belongs to such as these'

A² 19:16-22 Dialogue with a rich young man – <u>wealth and possessions</u>

'it is hard for a rich man to enter the kingdom of heaven'

B² 19:23-30 Disciples confused (worldly) about riches/entry into the kingdom 'Who then can be saved?'

> Jesus teaches them... 'what is impossible with man is possible with God'

D 20:1-36 A parable: **the rewards God gives are a matter of grace** *'the first shall be last and the last shall be first'*

"A way of setting God's grace against all human notions of what constitutes firstness". R.T. France, Tyndale Commentary

C² 20:17-19 Jesus going up to Jerusalem Jesus teaches his disciples: he must suffer and die on the cross

A³ 20:1-23 Dialogue with Mrs Zebedee and her sons – <u>status and power</u>

'can you drink the cup I am going to drink?'

B³ 20:24-26 Disciples indignant (worldly) over this power-play

Jesus teaches them... 'whoever wants to be first must become your slave – just as the Son of Man did not come to be served but to serve and give his life as a ransom for many'

C³ 20:29-34 Jesus and his disciples leaving Jericho; two blind men want to see

Jesus has compassion on them and gives them sight
